BOOK OF THE MONTH Mary's Last Dance by Mary Li

The untold story of the Wife of Mao's Last Dancer.

Growing up in a rambunctious family in Rockhampton, Mary discovered an extraordinary early passion for ballet. It saw her move to London at the age of sixteen, to study at the Royal Ballet School and dance at the London Festival Ballet with the likes of Rudolf Nureyev, and to Houston Ballet, where as principal dancer she fell in love with the acclaimed dancer Li Cunxin. The couple became the darlings of the dance world and were happier than they could have imagined at the arrival of their firstborn daughter, Sophie.

Then right at the height of her international career, Mary seemingly disappeared from view. What could have happened to cause a woman so committed, so talented, to give it all away in a heatbeat? Now, almost twenty years on, we learn what unfolded next for this inspiring family and why it is Mary's turn to tell a truly remarkable tale.

The Good Sister by Sally Hepworth

Fern Castle works at her local library. She has dinner with her twin sister, Rose, three nights a week. And she avoids crowds, bright lights and loud noises as much as possible. Fern has a carefully structured life and disrupting her routine can be... dangerous.

When Rose discovers that she cannot fall pregnant, Fern sees her chance to pay her sister back for everything Rose has done for her. Fern can have a baby for Rose. She just needs to find a father. Simple.

Fern's mission will shake the foundations of the life she has carefully built for herself and stir up dark secrets from the past, in this quirky, rich and shocking story of unexpected love.

The Girl In The Ice by Lotte and Soren Hammer

Under the endless blue vault of Greenland's arctic sky the body of a girl is discovered. Half-naked and bound, her mouth smeared with red lipstick, she has lain alone, frozen in the ice, undisturbed for twenty-five years.

When Det Chief Konrad Simonsen is flown in from Copenhagen to investigate, the details of her icy grave trigger a dark memory. Back in Denmark, long buried evidence surfaces revealing truths that some would rather stayed forgotten. Simonsen has just one certainty to go on: the victims have features that are uncannily similar.

Dr Nicola Cousen

Dr James Stewart and the Ballaarat Mechanics' Institute

Ballarat's pioneers contributed greatly to the establishment of the city and its institutions. Dr James Stewart was one of these pioneers who significantly advanced the needs of the Goldfields community through his medical, civic and philanthropic activities. His name can be found in the history of many of the city's nineteenth century institutions as patron, trustee, committee member and chairman. This talk delves into some of his involvement in Ballarat including the Ballarat Mechanics' Institute where he was a trustee and a supporter of its work throughout his life.

Dr Nicola Cousen is a historian and consultant to the UNESCO Memory of the World program. Her research involves the history of Ballarat and medical care available during the city's first two decades, particularly in relation to the life of Irish doctor and philanthropist, Dr James Stewart.
