Exhibition | *Not the Last Picture Show* Friday 17 May - Sunday 26 May 10:30am - 4pm | Hugh Williamson Foyer

Just a year after the Lumière brothers invented the cinematograph in 1895, the first screenings of this new technology of 'moving pictures' were held at the Mechanics' Institute.

By the 1970's, cinema's death was being heralded after the devastating impact of television and the attraction of the drive-in, making the BMI's *Vegas* 70 for a brief time Ballarat's only indoor cinema.

Our latest photographic exhibition *Not the Last Picture Show* traces the history of cinemas in Ballarat, from the spectacular nitrate film-fuelled conflagration of the 4,000 seat *Coliseum Picture Palace*, (now a supermarket car park), to the *Skyline Drive-in*, now a housing estate with a 'Bogart Avenue'.

The exhibition will be held in the Williamson Foyer space, which formerly hosted the candy bar of the cinema, with an additional exhibition in our beautiful Heritage Reading Room.


The Vegas Returns to Ballarat: One night only

Saturday 18 May | 7pm - 11.30pm

The *Vegas 70* was once the most popular cinema in Ballarat. The Ballaarat Mechanics' Institute and Showbiz Cinemas have collaborated to bring back the Vegas for the Ballarat Heritage Festival.

The first moving pictures (called cinematograph) in Ballarat were shown at the Ballaarat Mechanics' Institute in 1896!

In 1909 the first bioscope pictures were shown in the main hall (now the Minerva Space) at the BMI. Later, in 1917, the hall was leased to the Austral Photoplay Co. for showing silent pictures. Then in 1919, a syndicate, including Messrs J. Clemens, C. Gemmola and F.S. Jelbart opened the Britannia Picture Theatre in the same space.

The Britannia was later followed by the Odeon Cinema, and then Vegas 70 theatre in 1966. The Vegas was a staple in the Ballarat film scene for 15 years. The Vegas was closed in 1981, after which the Sturt Cinema opened in 1994.

rom the Curator

This month we are featuring the old Ballarat Courier building on Sturt Street from our image collection.



MH 1363 | The Courier Office, Sturt Street, Ballarat

The Courier was established by Robert Clark and Edward J. Bateman in 1867.

Bateman was born in London in 1832 and migrated to Australia during the early years of the gold rush. Robert Clark was born in Dunfermline, Scotland, in 1826. He was apprenticed as a bookbinder with his father at just ten years old.

Clark worked as a compositor in Glasgow, Belfast and London before venturing to Australia aboard the *Black Ball* clipper *Champion of the Seas*.

Journalist Thomas Bury, or 'Tom Touchstone', who

contributed his 'cornerisms' column to *The Courier* from 1882 to 1900, was a fellow passenger.

Clark worked at *The Argus* before the prospect of striking it rich lured him to the goldfields. Failing as a digger, Clark had a stint at both the *Ballarat Times* and the *Ballarat Star* before starting his own paper in Talbot, the *Back Creek Register*.



He abandoned the *Register* for *The Northwestern Chronicle*, later renamed the *Talbot Leader*, becoming a part proprietor with Bateman. He also served as the Mayor of Talbot.

Clark returned to Ballarat in 1865, managing the *Ballarat Sun* before starting *The Courier* with Bateman in 1867.

In 1871, *The Courier* relocated to 24 Sturt Street. Despite its art deco-ish features, the current building is made up of two Victorian buildings, the business later expanding into number 26.

In 1889, Bateman left the business and Clark became the sole proprietor. Bateman died in 1893. Clark died in 1902, aged 75. He left behind his wife, six sons and three daughters. Clark's son Norman became manager of *The Ballarat Courier*, and three other sons were working at the paper at the time of his death.

The Ballarat Courier relocated to Creswick Road in 1982, ending 111 years at 24 Sturt Street.

The building has subsequently been occupied by the Liberal Party and Northgate Communications, both of which have left their marks in ghost signs on this now unoccupied building.

Explore the BMI

The Ballaarat Mechanics' Institute was established in 1859 on the top floor of the Ballarat Fire Station in Barkly Street. It moved to its present location in 1860 with a crowd of 10,000 people attending the ceremony to lay the foundation stone. By 1869 the Institute consisted of four floors, with shops on the ground floor, a grand entrance, a library on the second floor, and a museum on the top floor.

Books of the Month

Sanctuary by Garry Disher.

Grace is a thief-a good one. But she's always on the move, always looking over her shoulder, always alone. It's not the life she wants. Then a run-in with an old associate forces her to lie low in a small rural town, where she happens across an antique shop. The owner Erin is timid but friendly, and has a room to rent. And Grace glimpses a different life, and perhaps a home.

But there are dangerous men watching her, and Grace should now better then to let her guard slip. Because no matter how far she runs, her past is always a few steps behind.

What Happened to Nina? by Dervla McTiernan.

Nina and Simon are the perfect couple. Young, fun and deeply in love. Until they leave for a weekend at his family's cabin in Vermont, and only Simon comes home.

Nobody knows. Simon's explanation about what happened in their last hours together doesn't add up. Nina's parents push the police for answers, and Simon's parents rush to protect him. They hire expensive lawyers and a PT firm that quickly raps up a vicious, nothing-is-off-limits media campaign.

Soon facts are lost in a swirl of accusation and counter-accusation. Everyone chooses a side, and the story goes viral.

Nina's family is under siege, but they never lose sight of the only thing that really matters – finding their daughter. Out-gunned by Simon's wealthy, powerful family, Nina's parents recognize that if playing by the rules won't get them anywhere, its time to break them.

A Killing in November by Simon Mason.

Ryan Wilkins grew up on a trailer park, a member of what many people would call the criminal classes. As a young Detective Inspector, he's lost none of his disgust with privileged elites — or his objectionable manners. But he notices things;

they stick to his eyes. His professional partner, DI Ray Wilkins, of affluent Nigerian-London heritage, is a smooth-talking graduate of Balliol College, Oxford. You wouldn't think they would get on. They don't. But when a young woman is found strangled at Barnabas Hall, they're forced to...

Freya thought she could relax when Ryan's best mate Jamie got engaged to her best friend Hannah. Two couples, four friends – what could be better than that? But a day before the wedding Freya's torn between keeping the peace or blowing it up.

Hannah's perfect wedding is hours away and she's daydreaming of a honeymoon in Tahiti and starting the family she longs for when she hears the firstresponder sirens. It is a grass fire? Worse? And why aren't Ryan or Jamie answering their phones?

When a car veers off the road with devastating consequences, the small wheatbelt town of Garringarup is left reeling, but no one's worlds are more shattered than Hannah's and Freya's.

As disturbing details surrounding the accident emerge and questions pile up, ugly secrets rise to the surface.

Mystery, lies and scandal - it's soon obvious nothing is as it seems in this small town...
