#### Print Gift & Unveiling John Mildren OAM

John Mildren OAM was the Federal Member for Ballarat 1980-1990. Prior to his election to Federal Parliament, he had been from 1970 a Senior Lecturer in Education at the Ballarat Teachers' College and later Ballarat CAE. Soon after his election, he acquired one of the limited run of prints, made from the original woodblock, of **Eugene von Guérard's** 1870 depiction of

Ballarat as seen looking east from the tower of the fire station in Sturt Street. The handsomelyframed print hung in John's Electorate Office in Lydiard St North during his term as MP for Ballarat. John died in April this year. Shortly before his death, with the support of his family, John offered the print as a gift

to the BMI. The offer was accepted with appreciation by the BMI as a gift fitting well within its acquisitions policy. It is not a unique print but it is not readily viewable elsewhere by the public. As a remarkably detailed image of central Ballarat as it was in 1870, coincidentally the same year that the BMI's grand facade was built, the print will be of much interest to the BMI's many visitors.

# Rex's Snippets | The BMI Basement

The True Story

#### Why are there windows in the basement?

This is an updated account on the original article written by heritage architect, consultant and good friend of the BMI, **Wendy Jacobs**.

Wendy was part of the architect and advisory team that devised and formulated the extensive plans for the building renovations, including the theatre, Humffray room, lift and interiors of the BMI.



#### Wendy wrote in 2002...

"Those members who have ventured to the bowels of the Institute building will have noticed the windows in the basement. This has led to a number of theories about the building and the street level in Sturt Street.

'The Courier' ran an article last year about our hidden street. I am so sorry to tell you that this is just a romantic myth. The street level of today is very similar to the street level in 1859 when the Minerva Space building was constructed and in 1869 when the front section of the building was added.

The drawings for the basement are labelled in the architects own handwriting as 'Basement' and illustrations and early photographs clearly show the existing entry arch at street level.

So why are there windows? The architect's plan has the space in the east of the basement labelled "Restaurant" and the section that now houses the newspaper stacks was a kitchen.

The room at the west end of the basement was the 'Smoking Room' and entered separately through the west stair. The entry to the restaurant was through a stair and door opening off Sturt Street. To make the basement seem brighter and not so subterranean it was usual practice in the 19th. century to place cast iron grids in the footpath above and then install windows in the room to allow natural daylight to filter through.

Reference to these grids have been found in the minute books of the 1870's . The arched vaults at the north end of the basement are actually under the Sturt Street footpath and would appear to have

been installed as part of the footing system to support the tall building.

From early minute books it does appear that a restaurant operated from the basement in the 1870's but was discontinued. The street grates probably caused a lot of concern with storm water, dirt and rubbish having to be regularly removed. Letting light in to the basements from street level was a general practice and is used at Her Majesty's Theatre with pavement lights set into the footpath to light the basement toilet areas. In London and Bath you see narrow railed "areas" leading down to the basement with below ground windows. I hope this clears up the mystery for our members."

**Notes...** The basement has had a total renovation since this was written, the newspapers stacks have been removed, the window glass refitted, the water problems attended to, (although we have yet to see a flood up to our knees like a few years ago) and the complete area tidied up.



The commercial double oven stove was removed from the restaurant kitchen, and the single oven IXL stove was removed from the west end of the 'smoking room', and a more powerful pump fitted to the sump during earlier renovations.

Leakage from the Sturt street under-footpath drain still runs down through the arches, and a ground water incursion also appears along the base of the arches.

There are four sets of steps into the basement from Sturt street (on the east boundary), from inside the western end shop, from the internal passage near the lift, and from the rear of the eastern end of the basement.

The basement was the ideal space as a wine cellar for the Australian Wine Company for many years.

The contractor who built the basement in 1868 made a loss on the job, and requested an increase on the price quoted.

#### Rex's Snippets | Cornish Pumping Engines


#### A Treatise

On the 20th. June 1868, the secretary of the BMI, Mr. Batten, wrote to Mr. W.F. Fowler in London, the following...

"Only one vol. of Briton came by mail before last March, please send *Volunteers Services Gazette*, no news of the long promised case of books; I ordered many months ago *Pole's Treatise on Cornish Pumping Engines*, please get it if possible and send next mail."

Then on 15th. August 1868 he wrote again to Mr. "W.F. Fowler.. acknowledging receipt of invoice and forwarding second Exchange for 50 pounds. Pole's Cornish Engine requested no matter the cost ."

Why was the BMI so keen to obtain *Pole's Treatise on Cornish Pumping Engines*. No matter what the cost?



During the 1860-70's, there was vast interest in mining the deep underground old river beds that had deposited gold amongst the gravel deposits. The big problem was that these old river beds contained millions of

gallons of water that had to be removed before the gold could be extracted. Huge pumping engines were used in Cornwall, and it was found that they were also efficient in our Victorian deep leads.





These letters were written two years before the founding of the Ballarat School of Mines, so the Ballarat Mechanics' Institute was the place to go for engineers, mechanics and mine managers to find the latest information. *Pole's Treatise on Cornish Pumping Engines* was the publication that explained how they worked, how to build them, and also contained engineering drawings of the construction.

The Berry No 1. Engine Model of the Cornish Pumping Engine in Creswick Museum. Hickmans, later Walkers Union Foundry manufactured some of these engines in Ballarat.



Some of the local mines that had erected these engines include the *Berry Number 1* and the *Hepburn Consuls* near the Clunes-Smeaton road, the *Ballarat Mine* near the top end of Gregory street, the *Great Western Mine* in the paddock behind McCains factory, and the *Band of Hope* in Sebastopol.







# Recommended reads

*Refuge Rescue & Reform* by Dorothy Wickham & Frank Golding.

Rhoda Schutt was admitted to the Female Refuge in 1897. A month later she was safely delivered of a female child named Mary. When she is threatened to do herself an injury and kept the whole house disturbed by singing, dancing and at night refusing her food and her medication, Rhonda was handed over to the police and committed to the insane asylum.

Mary, her baby daughter, was arrested by the police in the grounds of the Refuge and committed to the Department of Neglected Children.

Lizzie Fairfax was arrested by the police in May 1894, Born in Collingwood 16 years previously, she had been living in poverty in a tent for around two years with her father and her brother, a boy of 18 years of age. She had hardly any clothes. After her father was gaoled for stealing, Lizzie was arrested as a Neglected Child and was sent to Brookside. Lizzie had a criminal record.

#### Storm Child by Michael Robotham.

The most painful of Evie Cormac's memories have been locked away, ever since she was held prisoner as a child – a child whose rescue captured hearts and headlines.

Forensic psychologist Cyrus Haven's mission is to guide her to something near normality. But today, on a British beach, seventeen bodies wash up in front of them. There is only one survivor, with two women still missing. And Evie's nightmares come roaring back...

Whatever happened all those years ago lies at the core of this new tragedy. Because these deaths are no accident. The same dark forces are reaching out, dragging her back into the storm.

# *The Lyrebird Lake Ladies Choir* by Sandie Docker.

Sisters Eleanor and Maggie have been running the Lyrebird Lake Ladies Choir for fifteen years. It has become a haven for the lost and lonely women who have found their home in the stately federation house by the lake.

Single mum Hannah arrives in Lyrebird Lake, homeless after being widowed and hoping for a new start with her son. With her angelic voice, Hannah could give the choir a winning edge. But when Eleanor hears her singing a long-forgotten lullaby, she is transported to her past, a traumatic time when two teenage girls were banished from their Irish homeland to a faraway country.
